## **COVID-19 ISSUE**

Vaccines are one of the best ways of taking action to look after your health. This edition of our newsletter will focus solely on issues around the Covid 19 vaccine as the vaccine supports the ethos of maintaining the safety of those we work with. We aim to provide up to date information from Public Health teams for those living in the London boroughs of City and Hackney, and start by answering some of your questions relating to the vaccine.



In City and Hackney the Pfizer, Oxford and Moderna COVID-19 vaccines are being used. They all require 2 doses for maximum effect.

• Can you catch COVID-19 after being vaccinated?

Yes, but the effects would be much less severe and there is less risk of dying than if you did not have the vaccine. Despite a high level of protection, there's still a chance you'll catch the virus. You should continue to follow guidelines on social distancing, mask wearing and hand washing.

• Can I hug my family after receiving the vaccine?

No, even after vaccination you should continue to follow Government guidelines around distancing and hygiene. It is still unclear whether you can spread the virus to others even when vaccinated.

#### Can I expect side effects from the vaccine?

Some people have reported temporary effects such as a sore arm, swelling and fatigue. Millions have now been vaccinated and reports of serious side effects have been very rare. No long-term complications have been reported. Experiencing side effects means your immune response is kicking in and can be seen as positive.

• Can I have the vaccine if I have allergies?

If you carry an EpiPen you should discuss the options with your GP.

• Do the vaccines contain animal-derived ingredients?

No, neither of the approved vaccines contain any animal derived products. They are however, tested on animals which is a legal requirement in the UK.

• Should I get the vaccine if I have already had coronavirus?

Yes, immunity from the vaccine is expected to be longer lasting than natural immunity. You should wait 4 weeks after your symptoms finished (or 4 weeks after a positive test result if no symptoms) before you get the vaccine.

• Should I have the vaccine if I have a cold/flu?

No, you should postpone having the vaccine until you have recovered.

• Will the vaccine cover any variants in the coronavirus?

It is expected that the vaccine will continue to be effective for variants in the virus this year. What we don't know yet is how long the vaccine may last.

- Vaccines are free and vaccinations are carried out at official sites, including some pharmacies and Gp surgeries. Nobody should come to your door asking for money for vaccinations. Some home vaccinations are being carried out.
- Be wary of letters, texts or social media messages relating to coronavirus that do not come from an official source, such as the UK Government or NHS. Pages on the UK Government's website will always end in 'gov.uk'.
